

Local writer gets world-class boost at festival

A local author who tested material from her debut novel earlier this year in Mississauga has made a huge splash at a Toronto literary festival.

Anubha Mehta officially unveiled her first book, Peacock in the Snow, on Sep. 28 to a hall full of patrons, readers, writers, critics and authors at the Lit Up Festival to an enthusiastic response.

"Peacock in the Snow is a story of belief, vengeance, and forgiveness," said Mehta, who has lived on both sides of the world and worked with diverse communities throughout Canada.

"It is a story of optimism rooted in the imperfections of life. The only way to overcome past wrongs is to face them, to conquer our fears and confront our inner demons."

In an emotional speech Mehta read from her book and expressed her gratitude to all those who touched her journey leading to her debut novel.

Mehta also paid tribute to the many stories that are not able to reach such platforms, and shared how the novel has helped her come to terms with the imperfections of life.

The novel follows main character Maya, and how her life with her new husband Veer is thrown into complete disarray when she accidentally stumbles on an ancient family secret.

What begins as unwelcome behaviour by Veer's family soon turns into something sinister. Trapped within the dark walls of her married mansion, the secret begins to haunt Maya and draw a wedge with Veer.

To escape the malicious spirits lingering in the house, Maya and Veer migrate to a distant land and start rebuilding their life amongst adventure and hardship. Not knowing that the ghosts of their past have followed them, in a race against time, Maya is put to a final test. Armed with conviction and courage, she sets out to face

the dark forces that lie await.

The book is a genre-bending thriller about the power of love, sacrifice and the tireless capacity of people to hope, strive and succeed despite impossible circumstances, Mehta explained during the event.

"This book talks about those sides of issues and isms, that fall within the shadows and silences of the noise—those aspects that are not often talked about," she said.

"In Patriarchy's forceful dominance – often women get indoctrinated as its gatekeepers and vulnerable men surrender their personal lives, dreams or love in a show of allegiance to this system.

"Across the globe, these issues and isms don't change, nor are they contained within geographic boundaries. They mutate with different cultures and colours and are manifest in a diversity of context, circumstance, and behaviours according to the tolerance and norms of

the place," added Anubha

Due to a tremendous turnout, the novel sold out at the book launch event. More copies are being printed and will reach bookshops across-

the country by mid-October.

Mehta told Peel Weekly News that she will continue to represent Canada and showcase her debut novel, on an international panel at

Jaipur Literature Festival.

The overwhelming response to the book has also resulted in plans for a second book launch in Delhi, New India in Jan. 2019.

Residents can rock their Halloween costume and bring their pumpkins to be lit up one last time before they're composted in the popular Great Pumpkin Smash! The event happens rain or shine.
